Community Service Endorsement

Community service is an act or actions by a person that benefits the local community. People become involved in community service for many reasons, but most often it is to benefit themselves and others along with the place where they work, reside of recreate.

"Community service" for the purposes of this document refers to projects that students perform outside of their regular academic schedule or school activities.

A study was done that correlates community service with academic success; it was found that there is a strong positive association between students who maintain a weekly community service record and their GPA compared to those that don't at all.

Examples of community service projects include:

- * Collecting items for charity such as clothes, food, or furniture
- * Helping the local fire service
- * Helping out at a local library
- * Assisting as a classroom aide
- * Tutoring
- * Participating in activities that benefit the wider community.

Students at Drummond High School may elect to participate in a community service activity/project in order to receive an endorsement on their diploma.

The following criteria must be met in order to receive the endorsement on your official transcript:

- 1. Students must submit for approval, a proposal of their community service project. This **must** be done before the project is to begin.
- 2. Students must submit a post-service reflection paper for review. If the service project hours are to extend more than one school year, a post-service reflection paper will be due by May 1st each school year.
- 3. Students must log at least 120 hours of community service between freshmen and senior year.

Community Service Reflection

Why Reflect? We do not learn from doing. We learn from thinking about what we do. Research shows that reflection has *some* positive impact on attitudes of volunteers regarding service. However, the lack of reflection has a strong negative impact on the volunteers' attitudes about service and the service activity.

Reflection is a crucial part of community service, which allows volunteers to look back on, think critically about, and learn from their service experience.

You will be asked to formally reflect three times during your service experience. Before you begin your activity, sometime near the middle of your service, and when you near to when you have completed your service activity.

Questions below will guide you through the reflection process as you prepare to write your reflection papers.

Post-Service Reflection

Answer the questions in a formal (edited and typed) essay.

- 1. What, if anything, did you learn anything from your experience?
- 2. Were your expectations about the service met?
- 3. What are the benefits of participating in this service activity or service in general?
- 4. Has this experience changed you? If so, how?
- 5. Would you do this again? Why?
- 6. What are the most important things you will take away from this experience?
